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
TAKE A HIKE ... IN EAST CHINNOCK!

FREE FOOTPATH MAP OF EAST CHINNOCK INSIDE!

The parish of East Chinnock is fortunate in being able to boast a network of around six miles of footpaths, byways and bridleways - all legal rights of way - and some well used but others much less so and thus liable to fall into disuse and become impassable.

The last footpath map was prepared some twenty years ago by Marianne Merchant, and following a discussion with her, it was decided that in order raise awareness and to encourage greater use of the network, villagers might find an updated map useful (there is a poster-sized version in the Village Hall).

Unfortunately I cannot claim to possess any particular skills as a cartographer and so cannot offer any guarantee as to the accuracy of the map, but do I hope some will find it of assistance when exploring the hidden corners of our parish. Mike Bussell

East Chinnock W.I. was treated to a most entertaining and informative evening on March 13th.



Vivian Wiles, a Food Technology Teacher, **INSPIRING WOMEN** related how her interest in cooking began at 4 years old, culminating in her virtually taking over the household's meals at age 9. There was a certain amount of trial and error, and the occasional disaster! but the self-teaching process yielded success and Vivian became a teacher.

Being interested in how nutrition was viewed before she was born, she discovered that 3,000 calories a day was the benchmark during WW2, but we now believe that 2/3 of that is ideal. However, the wartime diet had much to recommend it, being low in sugar and saturated fats, due to rationing and little opportunity to over-eat. Meals were prepared "from scratch" and people had to be inventive.

Vivian remarked amusingly that many people in the business of nutrition advice are not their ideal weight - including herself! She mentioned categories of food - such as carbohydrates, protein, roughage (fibre) and vitamins.

We sampled a delicious "mock goose (the name is a mystery) which was similar to a hotpot. It could be made vegan if non-dairy cheese is used, pieces of which Vivian brought along for us to try. There were also eggless buns, which were very tasty. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the time from start to finish, and we

can heartily recommend that other groups issue an invitation to Vivian! Roisin Gruner

ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Chairman's Report: Over the past twelve months the members of your Parish Council have once again freely given their time and energy on your behalf, to ensure the smooth running of matters within the Parish. Sadly the Parish Council accepted the resignation of ClIr Helen Early in September due to work commitments. We wish Helen all the very best for the future. Our new volunteer councillor, ClIr D Taylor, was co-opted at the November meeting.

Our thanks once again go to the Entertainments Committee who continue to organise the successful annual events in the village, rent out and erect the marquee and gazebos in their own time and for the benefit of all in the village. Last year's events were again well attended, especially the Village Music Night where Bertie's Big Band was very well received, whilst Bonfire Night also attracted a large crowd and once again both events returned very healthy profits.

As reported last year, the Parish Council decided that it was time to revamp the play area. There has been some movement regarding renewal of the lease but we're still unable to start making grant applications or plans. This remains frustrating for all concerned. The steering group headed by ClIr. Wicks is currently in a holding pattern. We still would like more members of the village to be involved in this project as once we do get going I foresee a very busy time ahead. If anyone would like to be involved in this project please contact any member of the Parish Council.

The Speed Indicator Device no longer appears in the village due to cuts the Highways Department. The Parish Council was approached by the Community Speed Watch Team to see if we could do something about replacing it. The intention is to get our own SID. The Parish Council will contribute $\pounds1000$ towards the cost with the remainder being generated by fundraising events and donations from local businesses. In the meantime our thanks go to the Community Speed Watch who have been out in all weathers, monitoring the traffic through the village.

We continue to be grateful to Mr. R. Pallister, our District Cllr, for being most conscientious in attending our meetings and providing reports from the District Council. We are also grateful to our County Councillor, Mark Keating who is equally conscientious in attending and keeping us informed of the county-wide picture. Once again our special thanks must also go to the Parish Clerk, Maureen Randell, who keeps us all well informed and continues provide a most efficient service.

Finally thanks to all those villagers who continue to work tirelessly and on a voluntary basis for the benefit of the village: those who cut the playing field grass, maintain the footpaths, edit, produce and deliver the Chinnock Chimes, maintain the Chinnock Round Robin website, the monthly lunches, the Coffee Morning organisers, the Gardening Club, the WI to name but a few and all the other organisations and people who continue to contribute to the wellbeing of our community.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Music Night

Music night will take place on the playing field on Saturday 6th July, featuring Bertie's Big Band. As usual there will be food and drink available. This year we are going to have a hog roast alongside the BBQ to give a little more choice. The event will be open from 6pm the first performance will commence at 7pm, we hope that as many of you will attend as last year.

A plea from the committee though, please refrain from bringing your own alcohol as this impacts profits which go back into the pot to enable us to continue with this event and bonfire night. We have also been able to replace the wooden bench at the view point and added a picnic Bench too!

County Councillor's Report:

Cllr Keating said that the council's finances had improved and a balanced budget for the next three years should be achievable despite it being more expensive to deliver services across a rural area than in the densely populated cities.

Council Tax Rise

The County element of the Council Tax will increase by 2.99% in April plus another 1% which will be ring-fenced for adult social care. This equates to 91p p/week increase for a Band D property.

District Councillor stands down

Cllr Rick Pallister said that this would be his last meeting as the village's District Councillor as he was standing down after twenty years. He said that most of his parish councils were apolitical and all had always been polite and he counted it as a privilege to have served them. The councillors thanked him and Clir Taylor said that he hoped his replacement was as diligent at representing the parish's interests and dealing with the queries as he had been.

Village website

Cllr Taylor said that no-one had been found to take over the village website from Julie Jewell and he said that if anyone knew of someone who might be interested they should contact the clerk.

LOCAL BURGLARY

There has been a burglary in the village recently - some items were stolen from a garage. Please be vigilant and be sure to secure your property

Here are some tips from the Avon and Somerset Police:

- If possible, have a security alarm fitted
- Invest in plug timers for lights and radios to give the appearance of people being at home
- Lock all windows and doors at all times-even those in unattended rooms when you're at home.
- Make sure your front and back doors are solid doors in good condition with a strong frame
- All external doors should be fitted with a five lever mortice lock. A deadlock will provide additional security. It's also advisable to have a security chain and a viewer fitted to your door
- Patio doors should have sliding bolts.
- Fit key-operated window locks to all downstairs windows and vulnerable ones, like easily accessible upstairs windows.
- Remember to remove keys from locked windows and keep them out of sight in a safe place.
- Never leave valuables on display by windows or near doors-especially those with cat flaps.
- Don't leave ladders or tools outside, or chain them up if you have to. They could be used to break into your home.
- Record all your property on national property database www.immobilise.com to deter thieves and increase your chances of being reunited with stolen property.
- Photograph your valuables and make a note of their description.
- Report any suspicious behaviour. It is common for an offender to check out a number of properties for entry points before finding a vulnerable home.

WHAT IS A HERB?

In botanical English, the word 'herb' is short for herbaceous, meaning a plant with soft stems that dies back in winter. Generally though, 'herb' is used to refer to a plant which is useful to us, for medicinal or aromatic flavouring, purposes.

Many popular culinary herbs also have medicinal and aromatic uses. We can often learn about the historical use of a plant from its Latin name, for example officinalis' refers to the plant having

been sold in apothecary shops for medicinal use as in Calendula officinalis, marigold; Salvia officinalis, sage and Rosemarinus officinalis, rosemary

Sativus means 'cultivated' as in Allium sativum, garlic, and Raphanus sativus, radish. Tinctorum or tinctoria refers to use as a dye plant for example Anthemis tinctoria, dyer's camomile.

Many of our commonly used culinary herbs, such as Rosemary, Thyme and Sage originate from the Mediterranean region; the plants producing their volatile oils to protect themselves from the hot dry summers.

English herbs or 'potherbs' traditionally used in cooking may have been Lovage, *Levisticum officinale*; Turnip leaves, or Good King Henry Chenopodium bonus-henricus or indeed any green leafy vegetable available at the time.

HELP AT HAND FOR DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN

Have you ever wondered what would be the best way to help children who are living in difficult circumstances? Most of you reading this lead comfortable lives, but there are hundreds of children across Somerset growing up in families who are struggling to cope, due to unemployment and a wide range of personal problems.

Research shows that providing a mentor for a young person from a disadvantaged background can make a significant difference. PROMISE works is a Somerset charity which recruits, trains, matches and supports local volunteer mentors, each of whom then builds a close, long-term relationship with a disadvantaged youngster.

When asked about their own experiences, the responses of the young people have been heart-warming: "She takes the stone from my heart", and "Mentors are like pillars. If they weren't there the roof would fall in".

We have more than 60 mentors already operating in Somerset and are looking to double this number over the next year or so. Many of the children and young people we support are on the edge of, or have recently left, the care system.
